

Remember being a kid and the excitement (or maybe dread) of starting a new school year? For some, the thrill was in wearing new shoes, breaking open the fresh school supplies, and starting the year with a clean slate.

Pueblo Community Health Center's (PCHC) School-Based Wellness Centers are no exception. With grant funding and financial assistance from Pueblo Community Health Center Foundation, four of the Pueblo City School sites (Centennial, Central, and East High Schools and Risley International Academy of Innovation) all received makeovers this past spring and are bright, fresh, and ready for the upcoming school year. New paint, carpet, window coverings, office, and exam room equipment were some of the improvements made. Each clinic has been decorated in its school colors and artwork hung to add interest to each location.

It is important to PCHC that all sites represent the same level of quality, care, and professionalism as the primary clinics do. School-Based Wellness Centers are a place where any student, in any school or district in Pueblo, can enjoy access to primary medical and behavioral health care. In 2017, the four City Schools and one District 70 clinics had a total of 5,387 visits. Over a five-day promotion in August of 2018, providers in our high school clinics gave nearly 300 students sports physicals so they could participate in the athletic endeavor of their choosing.

Keeping kids healthy, and in school, is the primary goal of PCHC and our partner, Parkview Medical Center. PCHC appreciates the generous support of PCHC Foundation and its board of directors for seeing the value of investment in the clinics that serve our youngest patients. If you happen to have the opportunity, stop by Centennial, Central, East, or Risley's clinics. We think you'll agree that it was a much needed, and well received, upgrade to every site.

I hope this message finds you well, and that your summer was filled with good times.


In this edition we are featuring our effort last year to "spruce up" the school-based wellness centers. I've toured them all recently and I was proud of the quality work that was done to provide our patients, students and employees with an environment of care that shows that PCHC believes they should be served in an attractive and comfortable setting. This is one example of how we live up to our Core Values of *dignity, respect, and customer service*.

Here are a few facts you may not know about the school-based sites:

- Students have access to the full range of amenities PCHC provides. The services aren't limited to "urgent" care or treating Algebra headaches (ha-ha!). Our care teams address a range of needs including preventive care, management of chronic disease, prescriptions, and care coordination.
- 2. There are five sites--four in District 60 and one in District 70. However, *any* student in either district may enroll and utilize the clinics. As an example, a student in a District 70 school may be seen at clinics in the District 60 buildings. PCHC has served at least one student from each school since we began operating the centers in 2009.
- 3. PCHC has a representative on the District 60 Strategic Plan Action Team that is addressing the health and welfare of students. Our goal is always to participate with the school's objectives and this is one way that we demonstrate our support.

Serving the community via our school-based wellness centers and offering first rate health care matches our Vision and Mission. We are providing access to care to those in need, and it's done with excellence on the part of the staff who are second to none!
